
Objectives

- To identify what the Domesday book was
- To describe what was new about the Domesday book
- To explain how the Domesday book helped William to keep control of England

Task I: Create a mind map of your ideas about the question below. One idea has been added for you.



The Domesday Book



In 1085 William the Conqueror decided to commission a survey which would list all the resources held by people in the various parts of England and how much tax they therefore owned him. He also wanted to know what was owed to him in military service. People to whom he had given land, known as his tenants-in-chief, were expected to repay him by sending knights to fight in his army. To ensure this happened he needed a written record of who owned which land. It was the first time any King in England had attempted to gather all such information into one place. William knew that knowledge was power!

Task 2: Read the source below. Write a list of what the King wanted to know in the box to the right.

From the Ely Inquiry c. 1085	
The King's official met the priest, the reeve and the	
six men from each village. They inquired what the	
manor was called, and who held it in the time of	
King Edward; who holds it now; how many hides	
there are, how many ploughs, how many villeins,	
how many cottars, how many slaves, how many	
freemen; how much woodland, how much meadow;	
how many mills, what the estate is worth now. And	
it was also to be noted whether more could be	
taken from the estate than is now being taken.

Teaching notes

As an introduction to the purpose and context of the Domesday Book students can complete the worksheet on p. I individually or in pairs as works best for your class.

The fun follow-up 'Conduct your own Domesday survey' activity is intended to help students become familiar with the kind of information that was gathered and perhaps to simulate, on a much reduced scale, some of the practical challenges which collecting this information would have posed. It takes around 10-15 minutes. Each student is given one of the character cards from pp.3-6. They then act simultaneously as their own character and as a Domesday official by talking to five other class members to record their details using the table on p.2.

The activity can be followed up with some more probing questioning either in discussion of for written responses:

- How would the people being interviewed have felt about giving this information?
- How would having this information help you if you were trying to rule a country?
- In the bible, 'Domesday' means 'Day of Judgement'. Why do you think the book William made might have been given this name?
