STALIN'S MESSAGE TO TRUMAN ON POLISH QUESTION

A Soviet diplomatic message, possibly from Marshal Stalin to President Truman, regarding the Polish issue has been delivered to US State Department by Mr Novikov, Soviet Embassy Counsellor, says United Press Washington correspondent. After its delivery Mr Grew, Assistant Secretary of State, conferred with President Truman.

Frederick Kuh, PM's correspondent at San Francisco, says Marshal Stalin's new instructions to Mr Molotov on the Polish problem have failed to relieve the deadlock. At a secret meeting Mr Molotov gave Marshal Stalin's message to Mr Averell Harrisan and Sir Archibald Clark-Kerr, British Ambassador to Moscow, who is with the British delegation to San Francisco.

"It is reliably stated that the communication contained a more friendly hreference to Mr Mikolakczyk, former Polish Premier, than has been heard from Moscow for several months," Kuh added. "This is described as the only encouraging fact in the new instructions. Mr Stettinius, Mr Eden, and Mr Molotov will meet again to review the problem."
